The 8 June 2022 meeting of the Northwood-Four Corners Civic Association (NFCCA) will be a Zoom forum for the eight Democrat primary election candidates running for the four at-large seats on the Montgomery County Council.

The nine member Montgomery County Council is the legislative branch of the Montgomery County Govern-

ment. All County voters elect four at-large members of the County Council. Five members of the County Council are elected by districts and only voters residing in that council district can vote for candidates of that district. (The NFCCA area is in council District 5; a District 5 candidate forum was held at NFC-CA's April meeting and can be viewed online.) All nine Council members are elected at the same time and serve four-vear terms.

All eight Democratic primary candidates—including four incumbents—running for at-large Montgomery County Council seats are scheduled to participate in the NFCCA meeting/candidate forum on Wednesday, 8 June 2022, at 7:30 p.m.

This meeting will be held via Zoom. The Zoom link for this meeting/candidate forum is https://uso2web.zoom. us/j/88309318257?pwd=sHWkE6uh9VE39qM80gyL3Oue qKBUqt.1 or via phone at +1 301.715.8592. The link will be available on the www.nfcca.org website before the meeting.

The Zoom connection information for the NFCCA candidate forum also will be publicized via the NFCCA *Groups*. *io* listserv and Next Door/Northwood-Four Corners and will be available on the NFCCA website at *nfcca.org*. All residents of the Northwood-Four Corners-Forest Knolls area are encouraged to attend this virtual meeting/candidate forum. The candidate forum also is open to interested members of the public.

NFCCA's last meeting, on 13 April 2022, was a District 5 candidate forum for the contenders for the County Council District 5 seat. The eight Democratic candidates for the District 5 County Council seat all attended the forum. The candidates opined on efforts to increase pedestrian, bicycle, and vehicle safety in the complex Four Corners traffic intersection and along nearby roads; on the availability and conditions of rental housing; on the Thrive Montgomery 2050 planning process, including zoning changes to permit denser redevelopment in single-family neighborhoods; and on economic redevelopment of nearby commercial areas.

NFCCA also sponsored an Earth Day Family Bike Ride for children of all ages around the neighborhood (see page 4). The bike ride finished at North Four Corners Park with pizza and beverages for participants. Thanks to Ema Perez and his team for organizing the fun bike ride!

A Neighborhood Yard Sale—actually more than 26 yard sales—took place on 14 May at multiple locations in the neighborhood (see page 12). Kudos to Julie Whitcomb and Karen Donnelly for their work in planning, organizing, and marketing the neighborhood yard sale. There have been other fun civic activities this spring, such as a plant swap sponsored by the newly formed Northwood Garden Club.

Finally, please save the date—Tuesday, 2 August—for NFCCA's annual National Night Out celebration (see page 15). National Night Out will be held at the Forest Knolls Pool and include the traditional potluck dinner, as well as snow cones, swimming, and visits from local officials.

NFCCA does not meet during the summer months so we will next see you in October. By then, we hope to resume in-person meetings at Forest Knolls Elementary School.

■ Laurie-Anne Sayles (FDA employee and former Gaithersburg City Council member).

There also are three Republicans running for at large Council positions: Christopher Fiotes, Lenard Lieber, and Dwight Patel. Because there are four at-large Council seats and only three Republicans are running in the primary election, all three of the Republican candidates will appear on the general election ballot in November 2022.

Maryland primary elec-

tions are closed party primaries. You must be a registered Democrat or Republican to vote for that party's candidates for all elective offices other than nonpartisan Board of Education offices. The primary election will be held on 19 July 2022. Early voting and voting by mail will be available for the primary election, as well as voting in person at Forest Knolls Elementary School, the polling place for our Precinct 13-11. In the November general election, all registered voters may vote for any candidate or ballot question.

The recent Latin-infused "Salsa in the Park" event sponsored by the Montgomery County Parks Department showed us that music and food can bring so many neighbors together for a fun time; the committee aspires to bring more events like it to our neighborhood.

The Northwood-Four Corners Diversity Committee is looking for neighbors with an interest in helping to organize events, translating articles (especially into Amharic or Spanish), or sharing ideas for celebrating our diversity. NFCCA's main annual expenditure is for printing the *Northwood News*, but infla-



tion is taking its toll on our printing expenses this year! Last year, despite efforts to attract additional paving advertisers, the newsletter lost money and is expected to do so again in 2022. Jacquie Bokow, the newsletter editor, and our Board members often hear compliments about the quality and newsworthiness of our neighborhood newsletter. If our expenses continue to exceed our income, then we would be forced to implement measures such as increasing the annual NFCCA dues, cutting newsletter production to fewer issues a year, or publishing the Northwood News online-only.

NFCCA Board members are also trying to put together more social events. Last fall, NFCCA sponsored two Halloween contests, earlier this spring we had a Family Bike Ride with over 60 participants, in mid-May we hosted both a Neighborhood Yard Sale and a Northwood Garden Club plant swap. In August we are looking forward to

National Night Out at the Forest Knolls Pool (see page 15). These activities don't cost a lot, but there are expenses to publicize and host these social events. We've had fun planning these events and hope you have enjoyed participating. We would hate to be forced to cut back on social gatherings for budgetary reasons, because that is what a community is about.

Did You Know? Services Available in the Community

Get Free At-Home PCR Covid Tests

Free at-home PCR test kits for COVID-19 continue to be available from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., seven days a week, at the Dennis Avenue Health Center of the Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services (2000 Dennis Avenue, Silver Spring, MD 20902). Bring identification with your current address as the tests are only for county residents. PCR tests detect the presence of the COVID-19 virus in your body. Residents register when they pick the tests up, administer the tests at home, and return the kits to 2000 Dennis Avenue for laboratory processing. Test results are emailed to residents within 48 hours. In-person PCR testing also continues. July Primary Election

On July 19, there will be a primary election. In Maryland, primary election votes are within your registered party. Registered Democrats vote among the Democratic candidates, Republicans vote for Republican candidates, and "unaffiliated voters" (called Independent voters in some other states) vote only for positions such as the Board of Education that are not party-based. In Montgomery County, the County **Executive and several County** Council seats are up for election. In Maryland, the governor and legislators are also up for election.

In 2020, every registered voter was given an automatic option of mailing in their ballot. This year, you have to request a mail-in ballot by 21 June if you don't want to go in-person to an Early Voting Center or to vote on election day. Letters to request mail-in ballots were sent to all registered voters from the Maryland Board of Elections. Maryland has same-day voter registration at the polls as well.

Do you want to support fair elections? Consider volunteering with the Montgomery County Board of Elections. There is a great need for volunteers for the upcoming primary election on 19 July, in the Early Voting Centers, and in the general election in November. Volunteers participate in online and in-person training, and receive a stipend after fulfilling their commitment to work on Election Day. I have volunteered since 2016 and I've found it to be very rewarding to be among members of different political parties working together to ensure voters exercise their right to vote. Information on volunteering, redistricting maps, voter registration information, and more can be found at www.montgomerycountymd.gov/Elections or by calling 311 (240.777.0311).

The County's Future Vote program is one of only two

programs in the U.S. that allow teens who are registered to vote but under 18 years old to volunteer at election polling sites. Participating teens earn Student Service Learning hours. I have met teens who were inspired by their volunteer experience to return as volunteers, recruit others to participate in Future Vote, and who encouraged friends and family to vote in elections. If you're not sure who to vote for, the League of Women Voters is a great resource. The League sends each candidate on the ballot a questionnaire and publishes their responses. The League of Women Voters can be found online at www.lwv.org. [See page one for candidates forumat the June meeting.]

Free Trees from the County

Does your lawn crave shade? Free native Maryland shade trees can be requested from the Montgomery County Department of Environmental Protection. I've heard from a neighbor that it can take a while for the free tree to arrive but, to me, a free tree is a long-term investment worth checking out. Trees are delivered at 10 feet tall and can grow to 50 feet. More information is available at *treemontgomery*. *org* or call 311.

Saving Our Black Walnut 'Witness Tree'

Once or twice nearly every day, I walk with my pup or my husband through North Four Corners Park and up the path around the soccer field, stopping to gaze at the huge native black walnut tree that crowns the field, encircled by a protective wooden fence.

Often, I can't resist telling a passerby, "Hey, did you know that tree is nearly 200 years old?"

I want everyone to experience the wonder of our "witness tree," a living organism that has seen so much history. Our walnut tree was about 30 years old when Abe Lincoln was inaugurated in 1861, 50 when Thomas Edison invented the light bulb. It marked its centenary year when Amelia Earhart flew across the Atlantic, and passed 125 when Rosa Parks refused to move to the back of the bus.

And I want folks to know we can't take that tree for granted. It might have been destroyed if not for the dedicated efforts of our civic association at the time, led by our neighbors Carole Barth and her husband, Jim Zepp.

First, the group petitioned the county in 1996 to purchase the land where the soccer field sits when it was put on the market after the closing of a private school. By preventing the land from being sold to developers, this purchase added 6 acres to the original 7.9 acres of North Four Corners Park, and kept the tree from being sacrificed to make way for new housing.

Then the NFCCA battled



relentlessly for years for the preservation of the walnut tree as well as of other native species as the county planned, designed, and constructed the new park area, a process that took 13 years from its start in 2003. Some of the county's proposed designs which NFCCA fought would have destroyed the walnut tree.

To try to inspire county planners to save this tree, Carole arranged for a local tree expert to estimate its age. Among other considerations, this was accomplished by measuring the tree's circumference at about four and a half feet high, calculating the diameter and multiplying that by the black walnut's speciesspecific number of 4.5, which put the tree at about 180 years old at the time. Jim also produced a timeline for the tree. listing the historical events it would have "witnessed" since it sprouted around 1830.

Carole and Jim saved the tree from possible destruction on a February morning in 2008 when they discovered that a county work crew of 8 to 10 men with heavy equipment had been "rampaging" through the new parcel, including under the walnut, Carole said, felling and clearing out trees and digging

out boulders. Carole went straight up there and found the workers on break but was told that the goal was "to be able to see from University Blvd. to the rec center." She stayed for hours, prepared to "lie down in front of the bulldozer" to protect the walnut tree. Meanwhile, Jim had called the local press and then-Councilmember Marc Elrich, and—when Elrich's staff person and a reporter showed up—the work was shut down for the day.

Thanks to NFCCA's persistence, the county's final plan for the park preserved the black walnut, and a fence was added to keep heavy equipment off the critical roots. Ironically, given how hard the civic association had to work to save that tree during the county's design and construction process, when the county itself advertised the re-opening of the North Four Corners Local Park in April 2016, it touted among the park's benefits its "protection for a significant walnut tree."

When I told Carole about my love for that tree and my awe at its longevity, she understood exactly what I meant. "The long-lived trees have a different experience of time than we do," she said, "and by knowing them, we get a little peak into that window. It enlarges us in a sense, because by having a connection with something so old and so large, it's so much more than us. And when you touch that bark, you are in a sense touching that time. It makes that time so much more real."
